PROFILE OF SERVICE

In the process of editing some of your testimonies, I "accidentally" found some of our members ministering to exciting select populations. Our W.B.C. volunteers asked me to follow Psalm 115:1 which says, "Not to us, O Lord, not to us, but to your name be the glory, because of your love and faithfulness." (NIV). Therefore I have chosen to describe their activities, and some of the results in the hope that you may be encouraged and. possibly want to support or join them.

KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY





Like many of you, I had not heard of this ministry before talking to Earl Miller, our 5 year team member who described a recent bi-annual weekend retreat he and 26 other team members spent ministering to 42 inmates at the Roxbury Correctional Institution in Hagerstown, Md. While the team spent the nights in a nearby motel (at their own expense) where they enjoyed a good breakfast, they invested most of their waking time for the next 4 days in the prison library, and ate the (not so good) prison food for lunch and dinner.

Volunteers begin arriving at the prison library around noon on Thursday. The inmates came at 6:00 P.M. thus giving the team time to set up their sound system, band stand, arrange seven tables (seven in Biblical numeracy stands for complete) and chairs in such a way as to give some privacy to participants during their sharing times. Each table had an ordained pastor, and two discussion leaders who would introduce themselves and share their testimony. Team members then selected one or two inmate names to sponsor, i.e. introduce to the whole group, listen to, support, encourage and write to during the weekend. After the introductions, the spokesperson for Kairos Ministry shared the agenda for the weekend. Next, everyone participated in the first of 9 "Chapel Times" where they worshipped in music and heard an ordained pastor's message. The evening ended around 8:30 P. M.

Friday and Saturday were long days beginning at 7:00 A.M. and continued until 8:30 P.M. that evening. There were 4 Chapel Times per day interspersed with discussions and testimonies. It should be noted that as the weekend progressed, both prisoners and volunteers prayed for each other before they gave their testimonies. As bonding grew, relationships began to develop. Kairos moto became apparent, "love them, love them, listen, and listen." On Saturday afternoon, each volunteer wrote 2 encouraging, uplifting letters to "his" inmate(s).

Sunday afternoon was feedback time for the team when the inmates get a chance (and microphone) to share what they got out of the weekend -with one caveat- don't thank Kairos members. If anything good came out of the time spent together, give God the Glory (see Psalm 115:1).

The inmates had to deal with some difficult questions.

What brought you to this weekend? What was your condition when you came to the workshop? What are you leaving with?



When words failed these hardened prisoners, their tears spoke for them.

While their responses varied, their thankfulness to God and to the volunteers was moving. Some accepted Christ, others became leaders in the prison ministry program.

This sounds fine, but what about follow up? The team returns each Monday evening to follow up on their prisoner's progress.

Was the weekend "cost effective?" You can answer that question. It costs about \$6,000.00 each weekend. This includes motel costs, a Bible, a Cross for each prisoner plus printed materials. Each volunteer has to raise his share or pay out of his own pocket.

What about quantifiable results? Let's let Warden Miller answer this query. The prison's return rate is 50%. The return rate for men who attends Kairos workshops is 10-15%. Violence in the prison has been drastically reduced. "As long as I am warden, Kairos programs will remain a part of the prison's rehabilitation programs," .he said.

A few weeks ago, in the Community Bible Study lesson book, there was a question, "Have you ever experienced God comforting you, not by relieving your situation, but by doing something for you while you remained in it?" That is exactly what God did!

As I reflected on His insight, a tidal wave of gratitude and praise washed over me for the many ways God had blessed me throughout my life. God has blessed me by more than meeting my material needs. He took a kid from very humble beginnings and blessed him with a great education and two fulfilling careers. But even more importantly, He has blessed me with relationships with the most significant being my wife. God led me to a Godly woman to marry. She is, without a doubt, the Godliest woman I know. On April 6th, Julia and I celebrated our 49th wedding anniversary. I am so blessed to have her as my partner!

The biggest blessing of all, is that Jesus Christ has been a part of my life for over 50 years. I came to know Him as a teenager and one of the things that led me to the Lord was a fear of death. He has brought my life such meaning and fulfillment and lavished such spiritual blessings on me and yet I know the best is yet to come. I have unshakeable faith that I will be with Him for eternity. That is why I was able to pray, *"Lord I don't know what Your plans are for me, but may Your will be done."*

Jesus is my Savior and Lord and if you have that relationship with Him, you, too, can say, *"I am the luckiest person on the face of the earth."*

A Message from the 318 Ministry



Many of you have heard about this ministry called the "318 Ministry". It is our men's group which uses scripture verses to develop our mission and vision:

Genesis 14:14 – When Abram heard that his relative had been taken captive, he called out <u>the 318</u> trained men born in his household and went in pursuit as far as Dan

Proverbs 27:17 – As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another.

James 1:22 – Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says.

Titus 2:1-2 – You must teach what is in accord with sound doctrine. Teach the older men to be temperate, worthy of respect, self-controlled, and sound in faith, in love and in endurance.

Titus 2:6-8 – Similarly, encourage the young men to be self-controlled. In everything set them an example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us.

1 Timothy 4:12 – Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith, and in purity.

These scriptures motivate us to be "Kingdom Men". Men that will be spiritual leaders of our homes, our churches, our work and our communities. We meet on Thursday nights for a bible study. Our average attendance is about 8 to 10 men, however, 4 of those men are from the community and are not members of our Church. So when you hear that we have a men's ministry, it is 6 men. But we realize that not all men are interested in coming to a bible study. Some men would like to do work projects and we try and advertise as much as possible but we always seem to leave a few men out. Well, here is your chance to be a part of the 318 Ministry without attending one of our studies.

The ministry seeks to: Disciple men, take care of the elderly, with first priority to the widows, and to feed the poor. Our newest project is called "Feeding the 5,000". We want to be like Jesus and meet the needs of the poor in our community. Here is how it will work: We identify a housing area where the residents are in need; we then pray; then we advertise to the church as a whole to help in collecting food; we then package up the food in boxes and then once we get a certain amount of boxes, we then deliver to their door. We present the resident with a gift box of food. No strings attached. This is meeting the basic needs, 1 family at a time. The goal is to eventually feed 5,000 homes. This project may take 10 years, 5 years, 1 year or just a few months. God is in control and we want to be obedient.

The 318 Ministry will begin advertising events for work projects, prayer breakfasts, and even a men's retreat on October 21, 2017. We are praying for you and your decision to join this ministry and become a Kingdom Man. Our challenge to you is to:

- 1. Reject passivity
- 2. Accept responsibility
- 3. Lead courageously
- 4. Invest eternally

Summer Scripture Refreshment





Shepherding Our Children by Protecting Them

In our church tradition the spiritual leaders of a church are typically called pastors. Pastor is a very appropriate word to describe not only the spiritual leader in church along with the spiritual leaders of a family. The word pastor for those unaware is actually a Latin word that means a sheep herder that leads his sheep to pasture but far before the Latin term was coined Jesus himself compared church leaders to shepherds. The shepherd analogy for spiritual leaders means many things but I think one of the primary meanings behind the metaphor is often forgotten. Shepherds were chiefly responsible to keep their vulnerable flock safe even at risk of their own peril and so likewise spiritual leaders protect those in their charge. For those who shepherd children, protection is one of the most pivotal ways we act as their pastors and we must do everything it takes to ensure children are safe.

This is a theowillfully ignorant of the dangers children face loved children enough to wrap them in His arms.

Church leaders shepherd the children in their congregation and in their care when they ensure children are safe and protected from dangers every second they are in their care. Child safety measures in churches sometimes come across as an inconvenience or as unduly rigid, but churches that shepherd children well will be willing to receive such labels. Much has been written both by Christian and secular leaders about the various protocols churches should require to keep children safe but here is not the place to flesh those out. The reality is many church policies pertaining to child safety will be entirely dependent upon such particular situations as the church's layout and even the service structure. No two churches should have the same child protection policies but every church should nonetheless take seriously their child protection policy. If we shepherd children in our care well children will be intentionally shielded from any situation where they could be abused and we will guard their safety as vigorously as we guard their theology. Keeping kids safe will inevitably be an inconvenience and may even involve reallocation of church revenue but if we know children are created in the image of God we will see the inconvenience as worthwhile and the expenses as vital ministry.

I often say parents are the primary pastors of their children and such is certainly the case with this call to protect children. Too many parents have a laze faire attitude towards their child's safety even while taking great measures to disciple them in the faith. Parents shepherd their children well by being careful about who has access to their children and educating their own children about their God given rights to guard their bodies and say no to any kind of physical touch. Explaining boundaries to children and ensuring those boundaries are upheld is part and parcel to shepherding our own children.

It is a great blessing when we can claim children as part of our flock but with it comes the responsibility of protecting these vulnerable little ones that God has put in our care. If we understand being spiritual leaders is acting as a shepherd we must make every effort to ensure our families and our churches make every effort to be safe places for children.

Open Doors of Opportunity in Haiti

In March, Pastor Glen, Pastor Larry, and Don Klapka traveled to Cap Hatien, Haiti to preach and teach at a 4 day Pastors Conference. We experienced many blessings and answers to our prayers on this trip.





We toured an orphanage 15 minutes from the village of Macaty that is called Idadee. They have a guest house called The Joshua House for mission teams to stay. Rooms include their own facilities and a dining hall provides meals for the team, and they will pack lunches for us to go offsite for mission projects.

Idadee currently meets the needs of 35 orphans with room for 10 more. Located also on the 15 acre property is a school, agricultural projects, a hospital, and an outdoor chapel.

The orphanage is supported by a larger organization in PA called The Pittsburgh Kids Foundation. They help organize and raise funds for projects that we can be a part of such as clean water, latrine construction, home construction, agricultural projects and much more. They also offer child sponsorship on their website to help support the needs of each child there.

The Pastors Conference was very impacting to the 35 pastors as well. The potential for an even bigger conference next year is very possible. We were part of 2 services Sunday and had time to prayer walk through Macaty, witnessing and sharing prayers for healing and encouragement.

God answered our prayers and opened up the door for every concern we had for Haiti. Our next steps now are to organize a Haiti team to delegate responsibilities and then begin to select projects and mobilize teams to advance our Kingdom work in Macaty, Haiti.

John 15:7 says "If you remain in me, and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you." We truly saw this unfold with our very own eyes. All glory to God for what He is doing for us and what he has in store for our future in Haiti.

I was looking over some Pastor's Paragraphs from years past, and I figured in this, my last year at Westminster, a couple of my favorites might be worth a repeat. So here is one from 2008.

I had an unusual experience a few weeks back as I was driving into church. Down the road and at the bottom of the hill from my house lies a sheep farm. As I was driving by, I noticed a lone sheep in the pasture, just standing there with a plastic feed bag over her head and down around her

neck. How in the world does that happen? I assumed the sheep's appetite got the better of her and her head and neck just followed her mouth into the bag! Almost simultaneously there was another realization, "That poor animal is going to suffocate in that plastic feed bag!"

Well, I couldn't let that happen, so I turned my car around, and drove into the driveway of the farmhouse, behind another vehicle. The lady in the car ahead of me saw the sheep as well and was there to help if she could. We knocked on the door of the farm house and no one was home. The poor sheep in the field was without a shepherd!

So, there was only one thing to do - hop the fence and see if I could help the poor critter. (After all the root meaning of "pastor" is "shepherd" so now was my chance to literally take up my vocation!)

Now you must realize I did not grow up on a farm, but rather grew up in suburban Baltimore. I did not think about carefully watching my step as I walked across the pasture. My poor dress shoes - EEEEEeeeeewww! Not only that, I was not real sure how to approach a sheep. Do I talk to it? "Nice little sheepy, just stand still, I'm trying to help you..." or, since it was not only suffocating but blindfolded by the feed bag, do I just sneak up to it and grab the bag? I chose the former. "Nice little sheepy....." The poor thing stood still and didn't move. I was amazed that the sheep was not shaking her head trying to get the bag off. Suffocating and blinded, she could not seem to save herself. She was probably exhausted having tried this and that and now was just in a stupor with a "What should I try next?" kind of puzzlement.

I grabbed the bag. The sheep abruptly pulled away six or eight feet and the bag tore free from my hand – it was still firmly around the sheep's head and neck. Fortunately the sheep did not run far away – blindfolded by the bag, it would have no idea where it was running. I approached again and grabbed the bag firmly with two hands. Again the sheep promptly pulled away and this time I held on to the bag and the sheep was free!

Now I don't know what I expected next – some sign of appreciation perhaps - a thankful nod, a lick of the hand, an appreciative "Baa-aa-aa"? So what did that sheep do? It just wandered off without giving me a second look - the ungrateful wretch!

Now as I thought about this incident, I figured, there has got to be a sermon in this somewhere! How about,

"Chasing Your Appetites Can Get You in Trouble", or,

"How Do You Care for a Lost Sheep?" or,

"The Perils of a Being a Sheep without a Shepherd" or,

"Blinded and Suffocating in Sin" or,
